Students Get Involved at the Garde Arts Center



Thanks to the fund-raising efforts by the WRAC Board of Directors, transportation to the Garde Arts Center in New London was provided for 3rd grade students from Lebanon Elementary School on April 22. The Eastern CT Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Toshi Shimada, performed an enjoyable selection of works by Beethoven and Dvorak as the children played along with their recorders. The finale of the performance was a sing-along in English and Spanish of Jim Papoulis's "Oye". The children had pre-

event classroom preparation and enthusiastically sang along in both languages. The purpose of WRAC's bus transportation fund is to provide the opportunity for local schools to bring arts experiences to students and bring memorable enjoyment and learning outside of the classroom.

A4A Needs Your Help

When Hurricane Helene hit the community of Asheville, North Carolina last September, hundreds of artists in the once thriving arts district were displaced. The devastation was unmatched. The French Broad River rose to over 24 feet, and the waters washed away countless studios, shops and work spaces. There were 43 casualties from the storm, and an estimated \$53 Billion in property losses. According to the Asheville Citizen Times newspaper, the resulting debris from the event is 3 million cubic yards. To put that in perspective, that amount of debris would fill 140 football fields, end zone to end zone, and piled 10 feet high in each field.

Nancy Bunnell, a Willington artist, teacher and founder of the local Art & Garden Tour saw the news coverage and knew that something needed to be done to help the artists of Asheville who lost so much. She made connections with local art groups such as the Ashford Area Arts Collaborative, Windham Regional Arts Council, and Artists Open Studios, to name a few. Thanks to Nancy's vision, the foundation is laid for a major art and musical event to take place on Saturday, September 13, 2025, at the Jillson Park and Shaboo Stage,

Meet Marika Solomon Marcy 2025 Concerto Competition Winner of the Young Artist Competition



Cellist Marika Solomon Marcy received the Concerto Award at this year's Young Artist Music Competition, earning the opportunity to perform as a featured soloist with the Willimantic Orchestra later this season. A high school senior with deep roots in the Mansfield Suzuki program and an impressive record of musical achievement, Marika brings passion, versatility, and a spirit of curiosity to everything she plays. We congratulate Marika on this well-deserved honor and wish her all the best as she prepares for her debut performance and looks ahead to an exciting future in music. In the conversation below, she reflects on her musical journey so far—from her first cello lessons at age six to her plans for college and beyond—and shares the inspirations and experiences that have shaped her along the way.

Could you tell me about your training as a musician? Your first teacher, what music school, how old were you when you began? Was there a particular teacher who inspired you or who had the greatest influence on your musical development? Etc.

I began the cello when I was in first grade (6 years old) through the Mansfield Suzuki program. I took lessons from Sondra Boyer for my first four years and performed with the other Suzuki students at the Mansfield elementary schools and String Fling. I began to take lessons with Thomas Calabro when I aged out of the Suzuki program and entered middle school (10 years old) and still take lessons from him, performing with his other students in a recital every spring.

Many teachers have influenced my development in different ways. I will always be grateful to Sondra Boyer for introducing me to the cello and encouraging me to challenge myself and continue to play. Lindsey Clark, at the middle school, has also had a large impact by introducing me to fiddle music, orchestra, and chamber groups, as has Ken Johnson, who introduced me to choir and musical software.

Do you play any other instruments?

I do not take lessons for any other instruments, but enjoy figuring them out and learning the basics. I have sung in school and community choirs since middle school, and play the viola in my school fiddle band. I also know the basics of violin, bass, ukulele, mandolin, piano, recorder, and Irish tin whistle.

Please tell me about your musical achievements: awards, recognitions, solo performances, festivals, accomplishments, groups that you have or currently play with.

Outside of school orchestras and clubs, I currently play with the Connecticut Youth Symphony and the Willimantic Orchestra. I have also played with the CMEA Eastern Region, CMEA All State, and NEMFA Orchestras for multiple years. I enjoy going to local events like the UConn String and Cello festivals, Arazzo music festival, and fiddle festivals, and have attended the New England Music Camp for three years. I also enjoy getting together with friends to play chamber music, and performed with a quintet at the CT-ASTA Solo and Ensemble festival for three years. I have performed in studio recitals since middle school, and have performed in masterclasses with Richard Aaron and Samuel DiCaprio. Playing with the Willimantic Orchestra will be my concerto debut!

What is your favorite musical genre? What types of pieces do you enjoy most of all and why? Favorite composer?

I don't really have a specific favorite musical genre. I especially love classical and romantic orchestral music, but I can also be found fiddling wherever I can with friends. I'm not a huge fan of trying to play pop music on the cello, but am definitely a fan of many indie and rock artists. I also love movie soundtracks, and can spend hours nerding out about the composition of the soundtrack of Lord of the Rings. Basically, I love anything that I can either jam to or dissect (or, even better, both!).

I can't say I have a favorite composer either—it really depends on my mood. At the moment, I'm definitely a fan of Dvorak and Beethoven, but ask me again in a couple weeks and my answer might be completely different.

Are you planning to pursue music? If so, where? What would be your aspirations professionally?

Yes, I'm hoping to go to college for music! I don't know for sure where I'm going yet, but I'm hoping to major either in cello performance or general music. My top schools right now are Bard Conservatory and Brown University. At the moment, my eventual goal is to get my masters in music education and become a teacher, but that could change. I am also planning to get a second degree in chemistry.

Please include anything else you would like to tell me about: for instance: other interests, accomplishments, etc.

My other hobbies include reading, writing, visual art (like painting and embroidery), and working out. I am also a big STEM nerd, and love to learn about all things science and math!



Windham Regional

The Windham Regional Arts Council (WRAC) was founded in 1983 to help organize community arts activities for the 150th birthday of the city of Willimantic. The Council is a non-profit volunteer organization. The ArtSpectrum is published three times a year and highlights events and people actively involved in the arts

The organization financially supports the Willimantic Orchestra and the Burton Leavitt Theatre. It sponsors an annual art show for member artists. April, August and December feature a group show at the Windham Hospital Corridor Gallery. Members have the opportunity to exhibit their work at the Windham Hospital Corridor Gallery. Each year the WRAC holds a juried music competition for students aged twelve to eighteen and the overall winner performs a solo at the Willimantic Orchestra's spring concert.
