Poets at Large will continue their fall series on Nov. 23rd at The Vanilla Bean Café, 450 Deerfield Road, Pomfret, CT. The featured performer will be Massachusetts Lifetime Beat Poet Laureate and

musician Tommy Twilite.

Twilite is a troubadour who combines music, poetry, exploration and adventure into his performances. He is the co-founder and director of the Florence Poets Society and the



host of the Twilite Poetry Pub on WXOJ Valley Free Radio. His latest chapbook, "Kills No Bird" is a follow up to his 2021 collection, "Fifty Words for Rain".

Tommy Twilite is well known as someone who can transport an audience to another realm with his words and music. He was recently honored by the National Baseball Poetry Festival for his poem, "The Tools of Ignorance." Tommy is the editor of Silkworm, an annual review, and is a Lifetime Beat Poet Laureate. He believes poetry and song can renew the Earth.

These Saturday evenings of spoken word and poetry are from 7-9 p.m. Admission is \$15.00 and includes a give-away.

Poets at Large is a regional group of poets who read in CT and MA, now in its fifth year. Check Your Coins and Plan a Visit to Weir Farm National Historical Park

Julian Alden Weir
(1852-1919)
As the father of
American Impressionism,
Weir used new,
international ideas about
painting to change
American art.

Established in 1990, Weir Farm National Historical Park is located in Ridgefield and Wilton, Connecticut. Weir Farm is the only national park site dedicated to American painting. It commemorates the life and work of American impressionist painter J. Alden Weir, his daughter, Dorothy Weir Young and her husband, Mahonri Young, and later, Sperry and Doris Andrews. Other artists who stayed at the site or lived there, include Childe Hassam, Albert Pinkham Ryder, John Singer Sargent, and John Twachtman. In 1991, Eastern Connecticut State University Professor and WRAC member Andy Jones was awarded an Artist-in-Residency from the Weir Farm Trust. His 1998 pen & ink drawing of an oak tree, derived from one of his Connecticut landscape paintings, was selected as the winning design for the U.S. Mint Quarter Competition for the State of CT.



2020 coin was designed to honor Connecticut arts & the Weir Farm National Historic Site. It was designed by Justen Kunz of Utah and sculpted by Phebe Hemphill of Pennsylvania.

Weir Farm National Historic Site is located on 735 Nod Hill Road in Wilton, CT. The visitor center is open 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. Saturday-Sunday from January through March, and 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. Thursday-Sunday from April through December. The grounds are open all year from dawn to dusk. Park entrance and programs are free. Guests can visit more than 250 painting sites, sharing the same vantage point as the artists.

The 38th Annual Young Artist Music Competition

This year's event takes place on **Saturday**, **January 25**, **2025 at 1:00 pm** (Snow date Saturday, February 8, 2025 at 1:00pm) at

The Burton Leavitt Theatre 779 Main Street, Willimantic, CT.

While music touches the lives of each of us, there are those who choose to study music and learn to sing and/or play an instrument. Studying music is a very complex and arduous journey. It is an art form that requires great effort, tenacity, perseverance, and endurance. There are victories and struggles along the journey that sculpt and inspire.

Each year, children around the world begin to study music. However, only those with a true fire and passion will aspire to reach and achieve a level of excellence. For this reason, the Windham Regional Arts Council remains committed to hosting competition for young artists.

Over the past 38 years, the music competition is one of the largest events that WRAC organizes. We take great pride in showcasing our dedicated students in this forum. We believe we are affording them several opportunities:

- For our younger students in grades 7-9, this may be the only place outside of studio recitals where they can gain experience in performing and/or gain confidence to perform.
- •Undoubtedly, **every** student of music has spent countless hours in a practice room. This competition gives them a "why" and a reason to invest their time.
- We award not only cash prizes to those that place in the competition; but also, we have special awards for excellence in voice, piano, wind, string, and a community service award.

The funding for all of our awards is through dedicated individuals, their families and organizations who hold a passion for music. They want to insure that young artists can continue to pursue and be recognized for their accomplishments.

- Each year, we award a concerto prize to one student. With this honor, they **may** be offered the opportunity to be invited to do a solo performance with the Willimantic Orchestra.
- We offer an ensemble division for 2-5 players. This may include vocalists and/or instrumentalists. Students who are a part of an ensemble may also compete as a soloist.
- Finally, we strive to present a forum worthy of those wishing to pursue music as a vocation.

As we open this year's competition season, our committee is pleased to present to you some exciting changes and updates:

 After many requests from parents, voice teachers and students, the vocal division is now expanded to include students in grades 7-9. Students in grades 7-9 and 10-12 will compete separately.

Mr. D Scholarship Award

In memory of Ed Di Giovanni, a lifelong musician, music educator, WRAC board member, and competition adjudicator, his family has dedicated all donations in his name to WRAC. Through the generous support of family, friends, and organizations this award is presented to a

student in grade 7-9 for excellence on a band instrument or piano. For the first time in the history of the competition, there is a prize solely dedicated to the middle school division.

The Feather Spearman Honor

This award was created in honor of Feather Spearman, our previous competition director. Feather served for 20 plus years and continues to avail herself to us as we move forward. As director, WRAC treasurer and board member, Feather is the epitome of community service. The honor is given to one student each year who has utilized their talent and love of music to serve their community, a non-profit organization, a school, a faith based organization, health care facility, etc. This honor is the only award that is not performance based. However, it is presented at the competition. If you know a student that has shared their talent and love of music, please encourage them to apply.


WANTED:
